## I. Introduction

This report provides a community profile of Madison County. It is intended to complement the information found in our Virginia Workforce Connection application, which can be accessed online at:

The report is divided into three major sections. The first contains a profile of regional demographic characteristics and trends, the second supplies similar information for the regional economy, and the third provides a profile of regional education characteristics.

## II. Demographic Profile

### Overview

This Demographic Profile provides an in-depth analysis of the population in Madison County. Most of the data is produced by the U.S. Census Bureau, and includes demographic characteristics such as age, race/ethnicity, and gender.



### Related Terms and Definitions

#### Ability to speak English

For people who speak a language other than English at home, the response represents the person's own perception of his or her ability to speak English. Because census questionnaires are usually completed by one household member, the responses may represent the perception of another household member.

#### Age

The age classification is based on the age of the person in complete years as of April 1, 2010. The age of the person usually was derived from their date of birth information. Their reported age was used only when date of birth information was unavailable.

#### Gender


The data on gender were derived from answers to a question that was asked of all people. Individuals were asked to mark either "male" or "female" to indicate their gender. For most cases in which gender was not reported, it was determined by the appropriate entry from the person's given (i.e., first) name and household relationship. Otherwise, gender was imputed according to the relationship to the householder and the age of the person.

#### Race

The concept of race as used by the Census Bureau reflects self-identification by people according to the race or races with which they most closely identify. The categories are sociopolitical constructs and should not be interpreted as being scientific or anthropological in nature. Furthermore, the race categories include both racial and national-origin groups.

**Please note:** In the past, our population by race/ethnicity data has always excluded the Hispanic ethnicity from each race category. Starting in January 2013, each race category now includes all ethnicities.



## III. Economic Profile

### Overview

The Economic Profile of Madison County consists primarily of data produced by the Virginia Employment Commission, U.S. Census Bureau, and the Bureau of Labor Statistics.



### Related Terms and Definitions

#### **Average Weekly Wage**

Computed as average quarterly wages divided by 13.

#### **Consumer Price Index (CPI)**

The Consumer Price Index measures the average change over time in the prices paid by urban consumers for a representative market basket of consumer goods and services.

#### **Local Employment Dynamics (LED)**

The Local Employment Dynamics Program at the Census Bureau, together with its state partners, provides employment information at the county, city, and Workforce Investment Area level. This information tracks workers in different industries by age and gender and provides statistics on job creation, separation, turnover, and wages.

#### **Quarterly Census of Employment & Wages (QCEW)**

A federal/state cooperative program that collects and compiles employment and wage data for workers covered by state unemployment insurance (UI) laws and the federal civilian workers covered by Unemployment Compensation for Federal Employees (UCFE). These data are maintained at the state in micro and macro levels and also sent to BLS quarterly.

#### **Unemployment Insurance (UI)**


Unemployment insurance is a program for the accumulation of funds paid by employers to be used for the payment of unemployment insurance to workers during periods of unemployment which are beyond the workers' control. Unemployment insurance replaces a part of the worker's wage loss if he becomes eligible for payments.

#### **Unemployment Rate**

The number of unemployed people as a percentage of the labor force.









### Employment by Industry






### New Hires by Industry


### Turnover by Industry





### Related Terms and Definitions

#### **Associate's degree**

An award that normally requires at least two but less than four years of full-time equivalent college work.

#### **Bachelor's degree**

An award that normally requires at least four but not more than five years of full-time equivalent college-level work.

#### **Post-baccalaureate certificate**

An award that requires completion of an organized program of study equivalent to 18 semester credit hours beyond the bachelor's. It is designed for persons who have completed a bachelor's degree, but do not meet the requirements of a master's degree.

#### **Master's degree**

An award that requires the successful completion of a program of study of at least the full-time equivalent of one but not more than two academic years of work beyond the bachelor's degree.

#### **Post-master's certificate**

An award that requires completion of an organized program of study equivalent to 24 semester credit hours beyond the master's degree, but does not meet the requirements of academic degrees at the doctor's level.

#### **Doctor's degree**


The highest award a student can earn for graduate study.

#### **First-professional degree**



### Educational Attainment by Age





## Lieutenant/DO Instructions

This packet is intended for use daily with all present MEMS providers. The Lieutenant or DO shall lead the discussion and facilitate an interactive setting. The purpose of this packet is to ensure clear, consistent direction on all shifts to all providers.

### One Provider Approach

1. Review with crew the current recommendations for approaching patients
  - a. **If patient is ABLE to WALK** (ask dispatch if this information is not provided)
    - MEMS AIC shall don appropriate PPE (non-COVID = procedure mask, possible-COVID = gown, gloves, PAPR if available, or N95 with face shield)
    - Coordinate with dispatch to have the patient wait inside near an exterior door (communicate which door to EMS) and wait for instructions from the EMS provider.
    - The MEMS AIC ONLY should approach the door, remind the patient to leave the door closed while approaching, and place a yellow looped mask on the outer doorknob or another accessible surface near the door.
    - Instruct any family members or possible exposed bystanders to remain inside.
    - The AIC should conduct an initial screening exam to confirm the patient may have COVID-19 per CDC guidelines as well as obtaining an initial impression and vital signs.
    - If the AIC determines the patient does not meet indications for COVID-19 precautions per CDC guideline the AIC may revert to standard level PPE precautions with procedure mask.
    - If transport is requested or indicated, the patient, if able, should walk to the ambulance and enter without the use of a stretcher or second provider.
  - b. **If patient is UNABLE to WALK** (ask dispatch if this information is not provided)
    - MEMS AIC shall don appropriate PPE (non-COVID = procedure mask, possible-COVID = gown, gloves, PAPR if available, or N95 with face shield)
    - No other personnel should approach the patient at this time.
    - The AIC should approach the patient and place a yellow looped mask over the patient's nose and mouth.
    - Instruct any family members or possible exposed bystanders to move to another room that can be isolated.
    - If bystanders are providing patient history, place a mask on them while speaking and move them to an isolated room once complete.
    - The AIC should conduct an initial screening exam to confirm the patient may have COVID-19 per CDC guidelines as well as obtaining an initial impression and vital signs.
    - If the AIC determines the patient does not meet indications for COVID-19 precautions per CDC guideline the AIC may revert to standard level PPE precautions with procedure mask.
    - The AIC should assess if the patient is able to walk with assistance or if the patient will require two providers for treatment or movement.
    - The MEMS AIC should inform their partner if they will be needed for patient care or patient movement.
      - This should be done while remaining at least 50 feet from any non-PPE equipped personnel.
    - If a second provider is needed, the AICs partner shall don standard PPE with procedure mask.
    - Every effort should be made to minimize the amount of EMS personnel to move the patient.



# COVID-19 Best Practice One Provider Approach Guideline



Adopted—March 12, 2020  
Updated—March 20, 2020

This guideline is intended to reduce the risk of COVID-19 exposure, preserve PPE, and continue to deliver the highest standard of patient care.

### 9-1-1

Dispatch will attempt to identify high-risk COVID-19 calls and have the patient meet EMS at the door if possible.

### Determine COVID-19 Risk:

- Confirmed COVID-19 positive test
- Symptoms: Fever, cough, respiratory difficulty
- Known contact with COVID-19 positive person
- Recent visit to Skilled Nursing Facility
- All high risk facilities (nursing home, assisted living, jail)

All cardiac arrest patients are considered high risk due to aerosolized droplets from patient during procedures.

### Negative Risk for COVID-19

MEMS AIC dons procedure mask in addition to standard PPE

### Positive Risk for COVID-19

MEMS AIC dons all PPE per CDC guidelines. Use PAPR if available

### One provider approach

Determine resources needed and notify crew via radio

Use minimum number of providers to safely treat and move patient.

Move to open air or well-ventilated area as soon as possible.

Procedure masks are to be reused for subsequent calls if you remain at least 6ft from patient. If contact with pa-

## Activity: One provider approach

After reviewing the one provider approach with crew, LT/DO present as a patient and verbally have the crew assess you utilizing the flowchart. Next, have the crew verbally walk through the cardiac arrest situation.

## Transport Guidelines

This treatment guideline is to provide temporary guidance to MEMS personnel for assessment of known or suspected COVID-19 patients. If patient is not suspected to be a COVID-19 patient, follow all normal MEMS treatment guidelines for patient complaint with the exceptions noted in “**Declared Emergency Transport Considerations**”.

1. Review EID information from dispatch
2. Determine ambulatory status of patient
3. COVID-19 Assessment & Screening
  - has patient been exposed to known or suspected COVID-19 infected persons?
  - Has the patient traveled in an area known to have community spread of COVID-19?
  - has patient been tested for COVID-19 and is awaiting results?
  - has patient traveled out of the country recently?
  - if exposure is known or suspected, establish timeline
  - is patient febrile greater than 100.4F / 38C?
  - is patient experiencing flu-like symptoms (muscle aches/pains, sore throat, runny nose, nasal congestion)?
  - is patient experiencing a cough?

If the COVID-19 Assessment & Screening is positive (one or more criteria are met) and the timeline indicates a high level of suspicion for COVID-19 the patient may be able to remain at home for self-monitoring utilizing the *COVID-19 Self Care Guidelines*, if **all** of the following conditions are met:

- patient must be alert and oriented
- no respiratory distress
- blood pressure between 100 – 180 mmHG systolic
- heart rate between 50 – 120 bpm
- SPO2 greater than 92% on room air
- respiratory rate greater than 10 and less than 25 without accessory muscle usage, cyanosis, pallor or other signs of distress
- patient must be able to tolerate oral fluid intake without vomiting
- no other complaints (chest pain, abdominal pain, injury, dizziness, etc.) beyond general illness / flu-like symptoms
- no high-risk medical conditions including pregnancy, chronic medical conditions such as heart or lung disease, liver, neurologic, metabolic disorders, current cancer patient (undergoing treatment or not), dialysis patient or recent organ transplant patient
- age less than 65 years

If the above conditions are met, the patient may be encouraged to remain at home and provided with the *COVID-19 Self Care Guidelines*.

If patient is suspected to be a COVID-19 patient but is not eligible for *COVID-19 Self Care Guidelines*, proceed with transport.

## MEDICAL COMMAND COVID-19 POTENTIAL PATIENT

If patient is a suspected or known COVID-19 patient and is eligible for *COVID-19 Self Care Guidelines* but still requests transport, providers should contact Medical Command for a declination of transport if transporting the patient would unnecessarily deplete local EMS resources and / or contribute to overwhelming of the receiving facility.

If providers have any question regarding whether the patient is eligible to remain at home and follow *COVID19 Self Care Guidelines*, contact Medical Command.

## MEDICAL COMMAND DECLARED EMERGENCY TRANSPORT CONSIDERATIONS

If a National, State or Local state of emergency is in effect, and in the opinion of the AIC, transporting a patient with non-emergent injuries or illnesses that do not pose a clinical risk to patient by not being transported by EMS, but would pose an unnecessary COVID-19 exposure risk to the patient or to EMS or would unnecessarily deplete local EMS resources and / or contribute to overwhelming of the receiving facility, the following should occur.

Every opportunity should be taken to explain to the patient that there is a state of emergency declared and resources are scarce. They should be advised to seek care at their PCP and use their own transportation to seek care. If the AIC has any question whether to transport, they should contact Medical Command or initiate transport to the closest appropriate facility without delay. If patient still requests transport, providers should contact Medical Command for a declination of transport if transporting the patient would unnecessarily deplete local EMS resources and / or contribute to overwhelming of the receiving facility.

## [Activity: Transport Guidelines](#)

After reviewing transport guidelines with crew, LT/DO present as a patient to the crew in scenarios for each situation:

1. Stay at home
2. Unknown if patient is eligible to stay home
3. Eligible to stay home but still requests transport
4. Transport



## COVID-19 Best Practice Transport Triage Tool



Adopted—March 30, 2020  
Updated—March 30, 2020

This guideline is intended to reduce depletion of local EMS resources and avoid contributing to overall overwhelming of the health care system.

### Is it safe for patient to stay home?

The patient:

- ✓ Is alert and oriented
- ✓ Is breathing normally without signs of respiratory distress
- ✓ SBP 100-180
- ✓ HR 50-120
- ✓ SPO2 >92%
- ✓ RR 10-25 without signs of distress
- ✓ Tolerates fluid
- ✓ Denies complaints beyond general illness/flu-like symptoms
- ✓ Has no high risk medical conditions (pregnancy, chronic conditions, cancer patient, dialysis patient, recent organ transplant patient)
- ✓ Less than 65 years old

**If all YES**

The patient may be encouraged to remain at home.  
AIC will provide patient with Self Care Guidelines.

**If ANY are NO**

The patient is not eligible for self care and needs transport.  
AIC will proceed with transport guidelines as they pertain to the patient.

If providers have any question in regards to whether the patient is eligible to remain at home and follow Self Care Guidelines, contact **Medical Command**.

If patient is a suspected or known COVID-19 patient and is eligible to stay home following *Self Care Guidelines* but still requests transport, providers should contact **Medical Command** for a declination of transport if transporting the patient would unnecessarily deplete local EMS resources and / or contribute to overwhelming of the receiving facility.

## Self-Screening Guidelines

Effective 3/16/2020, at the beginning of your shift obtain your oral temperature and then complete the Employee Infectious Disease Screening Tool under the forms section of EMS Manager. Make sure you have not had any fluids for 10 minutes before taking your oral temperature. This shall be completed as soon as possible after clocking in for your shift.

Employees with one or more of these symptoms:

- Fever ( $\geq 100.4^{\circ}\text{F}$ ) with or without chills
- Nausea or vomiting
- New cough
- Sore throat
- Unusual total body aches
- Shortness of breath
- Difficulty breathing
- Runny or stuffy nose
- Loss of smell

Will be considered to have a communicable illness, should not be at work, should notify Lt/DO and leave work immediately.

Crew remaining on duty shall thoroughly decontaminate all areas sick employee contacted.

### Activity: Self-Screening

After reviewing the Self-Screening procedure, the Lt/DO should have an open dialogue with crew –

Why does this process exist?

Reduces quarantine member levels, and reduces the chance of spread to family and community

What are the benefits of full participation?

Facilitates a less stressful work environment, gives employees who are symptomatic “permission” to be conservative and stay home preventing others from becoming sick.

What are the risks of non-compliance?

Significant increased risk of staff isolation or quarantine, risk of spreading virus in the community and to family members at home.

## Apparatus and Station Cleaning Checklists

Apparatus cleaning and disinfecting shall be performed at the beginning of every shift and after every patient contact.

### Activity: Apparatus and Station cleaning

After reviewing the apparatus and station cleaning checklists ask crew why the process exists, what are the benefits of full participation, and what are the risks of non-compliance?

Process **reduces** risks of exposure, possible needs to quarantine, risk of spreading to families and community  
Risks of non-compliance is significant increase to risk of crew quarantine or isolation, spreading the virus in the community and to families



# COVID-19 Best Practice Apparatus Cleaning Checklist



Adopted—March 14, 2020  
Updated—April 18, 2020

This guideline is intended to reduce risk of exposure to employees and patients.

Conduct at beginning of shift and after every patient encounter. Only use Sani Wipe Prim, Sani Wipe Bleach, or Danolyte solution with 10 minute contact time.

## Cleaning Instructions

Wipe down all reusable patient-care equipment including but not limited to:

- BP Cuff
- Stethoscope
- O2 bottles
- LP15 & accessories
- Glucometer
- All assessment/airy/drug bags
- Thermometer

Wipe down PAPRs

Wipe down interior of unit including but not limited to:

- Control Panel
- Seatbelts
- Grab rails
- Drawer/cabinets and handles
- Walls, ceilings, seats
- Radio
- Stretcher and handles

Sweep vehicle floors to remove debris and mop with disinfectant. Allow for the solution to dry before reentering to continue the decontamination process.

Wipe down surfaces on the interior of the driver's compartment including but not limited to:

- Radios
- Control panel surfaces
- Steering wheel and vehicle controls
- Seatbelts
- Interior door handles
- Tablet
- Clipboard
- Seats

Wipe down the exterior door handles and compartment handles and other potentially contaminated areas (backboards, stair chair)



# COVID-19 Best Practice Building Cleaning Checklist



Adopted—March 14, 2020  
Updated—April 18, 2020

This guideline is intended to reduce risk of exposure to employees and patients.

Conduct daily. Only use Lysol or Lysol wipes.

Common areas (wipe down):

## COVID-19 Discussion Scenarios:

Lt/DO go over these scenarios and how they should be handled, direct individual members to share their answers then collectively decide the best actions to take as a crew.

### **Scenario 1: You are dispatched to a patient that fell down some stairs**

#### Possible answers:

- 1 member to approach patient in full PPE
- Other 2 members standing by, within line of sight and voice if possible

#### **Lt/DO emphasis:**

- Provide good patient care
- Safety of crew
- Use only enough PPE as necessary to manage incident
- Provide updates to other units = PPE needed
- How would this be different for a CPR call? For an MVA?

### **Scenario 2: What can we do to help keep equipment clean and reduce crew exposures?**

#### Possible answers:

- Set a 'hot zone' around the patient (6 feet)
- No equipment in hot zone that can't be decontaminated or discarded
- Choose a 'clean provider' (not involved in patient care) for retrieving equipment (likely R3)
- Establish an area for contaminated equipment and garbage

#### **Lt/DO emphasis:**

- Prevent cross contamination
- Safety of crew
- Reduce need for equipment, decon following patient contact

### **Ambulance Order**

The ambulance chassis was ordered. I am meeting with our vendor PennCare on Friday May 8<sup>th</sup> to review the final ambulance box specs.

### **RSAF Grant**

Our RSAF grant submission is still in the review process. If awarded Madison County will receive an 80/20 grant for a 2020 Ford F150 Quick Response vehicle. Total cost \$59,999, state funds \$47,999.20. This is to replace Response 1 which we purchased used from Louisa County Fire and EMS several years ago.

If awarded Madison County will receive a 50/50 grant for four McGrath video laryngoscopes. Total cost \$9,570, state funds \$4,785.00. These video laryngoscopes will replace our current devices (King Vision) which we received used from Spotsylvania Fire and EMS several years ago and are beginning to fail. Endotracheal intubation is a high-risk procedure and the McGrath video laryngoscope will assist our responders in being successful with this procedure.
